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MOTIONS

11. **Need to Investigate the Losses, Damages and Casualties Suffered by Nigerians in Recent Xenophobic Attacks in the Republic of South Africa:**
Hon. Babajimi Benson:

The House:

Notes that Nigeria remains one of the foremost architects of South Africa's liberation, having committed enormous diplomatic, financial and political resources towards the dismantling of Apartheid, including sustained advocacy at the United Nations, the Commonwealth and the Organisation of African Unity, establishment of the Southern African Relief Fund, educational scholarships for South Africans and the imposition of economic sacrifices on its own citizens in support of the struggle for freedom;

Observes that notwithstanding this historic relationship, Nigerians residing lawfully in the Republic of South Africa have, for nearly two decades, remained recurrent targets of xenophobic violence characterised by killings, mob attacks, physical assaults, arson, looting of businesses, destruction of properties, forced displacement, intimidation and hate campaigns principally directed at African migrants;

Also observes that significant outbreaks of xenophobic violence were recorded in 2008, 2015, 2017, 2019, 2021 and on several occasions thereafter, each resulting in renewed diplomatic tensions between both countries, emergency evacuations of Nigerian citizens and repeated assurances by the South African Government that adequate preventive measures would be implemented;

Aware that the recent resurgence of coordinated anti-foreigner campaigns and inflammatory rhetoric by groups such as Operation Dudula and similar organizations created widespread fear amongst Nigerian residents, with many reportedly abandoning homes, businesses and investments while seeking emergency evacuation following threats and unlawful ultimatums issued against foreign African nationals;

Also aware that successive sessions of the National Assembly have, on several occasions, debated motions condemning xenophobic attacks against Nigerians in South Africa, expressed sympathy with victims and urged diplomatic engagement between both Governments, but none has culminated in a comprehensive legislative enquiry to establish the actual number of Nigerians killed, injured, displaced or the aggregate economic losses suffered by Nigerian citizens over the years;

Worried that every successive wave of xenophobic violence has been followed by public condemnation and diplomatic protests without a corresponding institutional effort to comprehensively document the losses suffered by Nigerians, thereby denying the Federal Government and the National Assembly an authoritative evidential basis for policy formulation, legislative intervention and sustained diplomatic negotiations;

Recognizes that a comprehensive legislative enquiry has become imperative not merely to establish responsibility for the recent attacks but also to document the cumulative human, economic and social consequences of xenophobic violence against Nigerians in South Africa, with a view to recommending enduring legislative, diplomatic and institutional solutions for the protection and reparation systems for Nigerians in the diaspora.

Resolves to:

mandate the Committees on Diaspora and Foreign Affairs to investigate the losses, damages, and casualties suffered; take inventory of property abandoned by Nigerians arising from previous and recent xenophobic attacks in the Republic of South Africa; recommend appropriate diplomatic initiatives, legal mechanisms, and bilateral engagements to ensure accountability for perpetrators, enhance protection of Nigerian residents in South Africa, and ensure effective implementation of relevant international human rights obligations and report within four (4) weeks for further legislative action.

12. Need for a Comprehensive Audit, Digital Registry, and Strengthened Accountability Framework for Seized, Forfeited, and Recovered Assets in Nigeria:

Hon. Ibe Okwara Osonwa:

The House:

Notes that Sections 88 and 89 of the Constitution of the Federal Republic of Nigeria, 1999 (as amended), vest in the National Assembly powers to conduct investigations into the activities of any authority charged with the administration of laws enacted by the National Assembly and matters concerning the management and expenditure of public funds and assets;

Also notes that the Proceeds of Crime Recovery and Management Act, 2022 establishes a legal framework for the tracing, seizure, forfeiture, recovery, management, preservation, and disposal of proceeds of crime and recovered assets in Nigeria and envisages transparency, accountability, and proper record-keeping in the management of such assets;

Further notes that since the return to democratic governance in 1999, various anti-corruption and security agencies, Ministries, Departments and Agencies (MDAs), regulatory bodies, and courts

have seized, forfeited, recovered, managed, disposed of, and repatriated substantial assets derived from corruption, money laundering, financial crimes, illicit financial flows, terrorism financing, and other unlawful activities;

Aware that such assets comprise cash recoveries, landed properties, shares, petroleum assets, luxury vehicles, vessels, aircraft, investments, digital assets, and other movable and immovable properties worth trillions of Naira;

Also aware that the Proceeds of Crime Recovery and Management Act, 2022 impose obligations relating to the management, preservation, disposal, and accountability of recovered assets and require proper institutional oversight to ensure compliance with the law;

Concerned that despite the volume and value of recovered assets, there is presently no centralized and publicly accessible National Asset Recovery and Management Register capable of providing comprehensive information on the status, value, location, management, disposal, utilization, and proceeds of recovered assets across the Federation;

Also concerned by recurring allegations of inadequate record-keeping, poor valuation practices, weak chain-of-custody procedures, asset deterioration, non-remittance of proceeds, conflicts of interest, and possible leakages in the management and disposal of recovered assets;

Cognisant that the absence of a unified national database undermines transparency, weakens public confidence in the asset recovery process, and impedes effective legislative oversight;

Recognises that the deployment of modern digital technology can significantly improve transparency, accountability, inter-agency coordination, public disclosure, and efficient management of seized, forfeited, and recovered assets.

Resolves to:

- (i) urge the Federal Government to undertake a comprehensive audit and verification of all seized, forfeited, recovered, managed, disposed of, and repatriated assets held by Ministries, Departments and Agencies (MDAs), anti-corruption agencies, security agencies, and courts from 29 May 1999 to date;
- (ii) set up an *Ad-hoc* Committee on Seized, Forfeited, and Recovered Assets in Nigeria to investigate the inventory, status, valuation, management, preservation, disposal, utilization, and proceeds of recovered assets nationwide and review the implementation of the Proceeds of Crime Recovery and Management Act, 2022 and other relevant laws governing asset recovery and management to identify gaps, inconsistencies, and areas requiring legislative intervention and report within four (4) weeks for further legislative action.

13. Need to Address the Devastating Windstorm and Flood in Gashua, Bade/Jakusko Federal Constituency, Yobe State:

Hon. Hassan Kaikaku Jakduwa:

The House:

Notes that on Wednesday, 8 July 2026, Gashua, the headquarters of the Bade Local Government Area in Yobe State, experienced a devastating windstorm and severe flooding, causing casualties, fatalities, and extensive property damage;

Also notes that over 2,000 households have been affected, with three (3) fatalities recorded, extensive damage to homes, telecommunication masts, and electricity poles, as well as the destruction of livelihoods and other public infrastructure;

Worried that vital sources of income—particularly in agriculture and small-scale business—have been wiped out, leaving survivors in dire need of emergency shelter, food, medical care, and rehabilitation support;

Concerned that without immediate assistance, the affected residents of Gashua across the Bade/Jakusko Federal Constituency will continue to suffer severe hardship;

Resolves to:

- (i) urge the Federal Ministry of Humanitarian Affairs, Disaster Management and Social Development to collaborate with the Yobe State Government to provide temporary shelter, psychosocial support, and rehabilitation programs for displaced persons;
- (ii) also urge the Federal Ministry of Humanitarian Affairs to urgently allocate funds for rebuilding efforts, livelihood restoration, and strengthening disaster preparedness against future occurrences in the constituency;
- (iii) further urge the National Emergency Management Agency (NEMA) and the North-East Development Commission (NEDC) to undertake an on-the-spot assessment of affected areas and urgently deploy emergency response teams, medical assistance, and relief materials to Gashua;

- (iv) mandate the Committees on Emergency and Disaster Management, North-East Development Commission (NEDC), and Legislative Compliance to ensure compliance; and
- (v) observe a minute of silence in honour of the victims who lost their lives.
