**ORDERS OF THE DAY**

**MOTIONS**

1. Re-Committal of Bills Pursuant to Order One, Rule 1(2) of the Standing Orders of the House of Representatives:  
 Hon. Francis E. Waive:

**The House:**

*Notes* that the following Bills were previously passed by the House on the dates indicated:

- (i) *Federal University of Technology, Kaduna (Establishment) Bill, 2026 (HB. 18), passed on October 22, 2025; and*
- (ii) *Federal University of Technology, Yaba (Establishment) Bill, 2026 (HB. 1910), passed on December 2, 2025*

*Aware* that subsequent to the passage, a rigorous technical and legal review of the clean copies of the Bills revealed critical clauses that require strategic refinement and fundamental structural amendments to ensure absolute legal alignment, clarity of purpose, and seamless implementation;

*Convinced* that the establishment of these specialized institutions represents a monumental stride in expanding access to qualitative technological education, and that the legislative frameworks anchoring them must be flawless, robust, and resilient enough to withstand contemporary institutional demands;

*Aware* that upon further technical review, it has been observed that certain clauses within these Bills require fundamental amendments to ensure their effectiveness and legal alignment;

*Cognizant* of the necessity to rescind the previous decision of the House regarding these measures to ensure the legislative framework is robust and serves the best interests of the public;

*Resolves to:*

rescind its decision on the Federal University of Technology, Kaduna (Establishment) Bill, 2026 and the Federal University of Technology, Yaba (Establishment) Bill, 2026, and commit the same to the Committee of the Whole for reconsideration and passage.

**2. Need to Establish an Agricultural Processing and Manufacturing Industrial Hub in Igabi Federal Constituency at Farakwai-Zangon Aya, Kaduna State:  
Hon. Hussaini Mohammed Jallo:**

**The House:**

*Notes* that Igabi communities particularly Igabi, Gadan Gayan, Birnin Yero, Kerawa, and Farakwai-Zangon Aya, have abundant arable land and produce maize, rice, tomatoes, ginger, soyabeans, and livestock, however, over 60% of the harvests are lost annually due to lack of storage and processing facilities which forces farmers to sell raw produce cheaply during gluts while the area still imports processed foods;

*Also notes* that food security and price stability can be improved through processing, which extends the shelf life of perishables like tomatoes and peppers, stabilizes prices, and reduces seasonal scarcity;

*Aware* that an agro-processing hub would diversify the economy and create jobs for thousands of youths and women in processing, packaging, and logistics, while also reducing rural-urban migration and insecurity;

*Further aware* that value chain development will link farmers in Farakwai-Zangon Aya, as well as those in Igabi, Gadan Gayan, Birnin Yero, and Kerawa communities, to processing plants, ensure ready take-off, encourage commercial farming, and attract agric-tech investment;

*Recognize* that Igabi's strategic location along the Kaduna-Zaria corridor provides access to rail and road networks, proximity to the Kaduna Industrial Layout, and export markets via the Kaduna Inland Dry Port;

*Also recognizes* that the project aligns with national policy frameworks, including the Federal Government's National Agricultural Technology and Innovation Policy (NATIP), the Presidential Initiative on Food Security, and Kaduna State's Economic Development Plan;

*Cognizant* that establishing an agro-processing and manufacturing industry in Farakwai-Zangon Aya will transform Igabi from a raw-material base to a value-addition center, lift thousands out of poverty, curb post-harvest losses, and position the constituency as a key contributor to Nigeria's food security and export earnings;

*Resolves to:*

- (i) urge the Federal Ministries of Agriculture and Industry, and Food Security, and Industry, Trade and Investment to conduct a feasibility study within ninety (90) days for the establishment of an Agricultural Processing and Manufacturing Industrial Hub in Farakwai–Zangon Aya and include the project in the 2027 Budget estimate under the Agricultural Industrialization Fund, focusing on rice milling, tomato paste, maize flour, soyabean, millet, and livestock feed production lines;
- (ii) also urge the Bank of Agriculture, Bank of Industry, and Nigeria Incentive-Based Risk Sharing System for Agricultural Lending (NIRSAL) to design a single-digit credit scheme for SMEs and cooperatives that will operate within the hub;
- (iii) further urge the Federal Ministry of Power and the Rural Electrification Agency to prioritize dedicated power supply to the proposed hub site to ensure 24-hour operation;
- (iv) again urge the Federal Ministry of Industry, Trade and Investment, through the Nigerian Investment Promotion Commission (NIPC), to invite private investors for Public-Private Partnership (PPP) to co-fund and manage the facility;
- (v) mandate the Committee on Agricultural Production and Services to ensure compliance and report within four (4) weeks for further legislative action.

- (ii) Airtel is to pay Mrs. Juliana Nwakanne, her dues from the Lease of the Landed Property for the three years that has elapsed.

- (i) urge the management of Access Bank Plc to continue engaging the Petitioner by giving him contracts on signage repair to sustain his livelihood;
- (ii) Access Bank Plc has agreed to offset the Medical Bill of the Petitioner Mr. Bolaji Yunus (Bolaful Solution Ventures) as well to compensate him for the collateral damages that he incurred for the period of years that he was unable to work;
- (iii) that the bank should present evidence of payment of Petitioner’s medical bills to the House;
- (iv) discontinue Hearing of the matter as both parties have agreed to resolve the matter amicably.

- (i) that the dismissal of Mr. Akinwale Tawfiq Tayo by the National Hajj Commission of Nigeria is hereby set aside for being unlawful, unconstitutional, and a nullity.
- (ii) that the NAHCON should immediately:
  - (a) reinstate the Petitioner to his position as Chief Administrative Officer without loss of seniority;
  - (b) pay all outstanding salaries, allowances, and entitlements (both onshore and offshore) due to the Petitioner from the date of dismissal to the date of reinstatement;
  - (c) ensure that Mr. Tawfiq is not subjected to any form of victimization, harassment, or discrimination in the course of his duties;
  - (d) review and strengthen its disciplinary procedures to ensure strict compliance with due process, transparency, and fairness in line with its Staff Handbook and constitutional provisions.

- (iii) urge the relevant government agencies to provide non-financial support such as security, protocol coordination, and international liaison, where formally requested and deemed appropriate, without creating financial liability for the Government;
- (iv) also urge the Federal Ministry of Sports and the National Sports Commission to clearly define and communicate the limits of government involvement in privately organized international sporting events to prevent future disputes.

- (ii) also urge Xernergi Company Limited to conduct a comprehensive Environmental Impact Assessment where none exists, and to implement immediate remediation and mitigation measures under the supervision of relevant regulatory bodies;
- (iii) further urge the Nigerian Upstream Petroleum Regulatory Commission (NUPRC) to review the Company’s compliance with the Petroleum Industry Act, 2021, particularly with respect to host community obligations.

- (i) urge the Management of the University of Calabar to:
  - (a) immediately payroll all duly recruited academic and non-academic staff from the 2019/2020 exercise as contained in the verified list of 385 employees submitted to the Committee;

- (b) issue staff numbers to the affected employees and forward the names for capture on the Integrated Personnel and Payroll Information System (IPPIS).

- (i) that the Independent National Electoral Commission should immediately restore Polling Unit 010 (Delimitation Code: 28-07-10-010) to its original and verified location at Ajapa Kingdom before any subsequent electoral exercise;
- (ii) that the Independent National Electoral Commission should correct the mislabeling of PU 010 from “Baptist School Oyeme Opuba” to “Baptist School Ajapa” to accurately reflect its true location;
- (iii) that the Independent National Electoral Commission should conduct an internal investigation into the conduct of officials involved in the August 2024 Physical Verification Exercise;

- (ii) that the Nigerian Army should conduct a comprehensive audit of detention records at the 177 Guards Battalion for the relevant period and make such records available for oversight review;

- (ii) alternatively, where reinstatement is no longer practicable, Nigeria Export Processing Zones Authority should pay full and adequate compensation covering: Loss of employment; Outstanding allowances (including acting allowance), Career progression losses and other accrued entitlements.

**25. Committee on Public Petitions:**

**Hon. Laori Kwamoti:**

***Report on the Petition by Inspector Fidelis Uti:***

“That the House do consider the Report of the Committee on Public Petitions on the Petition by Inspector Fidelis Uti against the Nigeria Police Force over unpaid salaries (2013–2018 and approve the recommendations therein” (*Laid: 6/5/2026*).

- (i) the Nigeria Police Force should immediately reinstate the Petitioner into service, as his dismissal was unlawful, having been predicated on a repealed law and in violation of his constitutional right to fair hearing;
- (ii) urge the Nigeria Police Force to compute and pay all outstanding salaries, allowances, and entitlements due to the Petitioner from April 2016 to date, in line with the principle that wages are due for services rendered;
- (iii) that the Nigeria Police Force should conduct an internal review of the administrative lapses that led to this injustice and take appropriate disciplinary action against officers found culpable;
- (iv) that the Nigeria Police Force strengthens its personnel and payroll management systems to prevent recurrence, ensuring compliance with the IPPIS framework and extant laws.

***Report on the Petition by U–Peters Associates and Consortium of Consultants:***

“That the House do consider the Report of the Committee on Public Petitions on the Petition by U–Peters Associates and Consortium of Consultants against the Maritime Academy of Nigeria, Oron for alleged non-payment of outstanding consultancy fees and approve the recommendations therein” (*Laid: 5/5/2026*).

- (i) that the Maritime Academy of Nigeria, Oron recognize and settle the outstanding consultancy fees owed to U-Peters Associates in the sum of (₦425,054,976.90) four hundred and twenty-five-million, fifty-four-thousand, nine-hundred-and seventy-six-naira, ninety kobo only, being a lawful obligation arising from services duly rendered and utilized;

- (ii) that the Academy, in collaboration with the Federal Ministry of Marine and Blue Economy and the Federal Ministry of Finance, develop and implement a structured payment plan to liquidate the outstanding debt within a reasonable timeframe;
- (iii) that the Office of the Accountant-General of the Federation ensure that provisions are made in subsequent budgets or through special intervention to facilitate payment;
- (iv) that relevant oversight agencies, including the Bureau of Public Procurement (BPP) and EFCC, further review the circumstances surrounding the duplication of consultancy engagements for possible administrative or financial infractions;
- (v) that the Academy institutionalize proper contract management and payment systems to prevent recurrence of such liabilities.
